

Special Symposia, Workshops, and Student Activities

Special Symposia

- **Doc Storm Festschrift** (to honor a respected person, during his or her lifetime for their academic achievements): This full day special symposium will explore the work, legacy, and the many individuals mentored by Dr. Robert M. Storm during his long and prolific career with Oregon State University. Talk with and learn about the man, the science, and conservation he lead and inspired from some of his many accomplished students! Contacts: Marc P. - NW PARC Symposium: Conservation Across Borders- NW PARC is excited to bring together a number of people and organizations that are interested in protecting wildlife and habitats across borders. During this symposium we will explore a number of perspectives and case studies pertaining to transboundary conservation and restoration mechanisms. We will also examine current threats and policies surrounding legal and illegal wildlife trade, the role herpetocultural societies can play in conservation, invasive herpetofauna, and the spread of endemic and exotic pathogens. The keynote speaker will be Jamie Reaser, noted author and conservationist, who is currently serving as the executive director of the National Invasive Species Council. More information:

- Idaho Bird Partners for Conservation- Presentations, discussion, and breakout meetings to provide cooperation among state and federal agencies, non-governmental organizations, private industry, and interested citizens to participate in the management, science delivery, outreach, and conservation of birds and their habitats in Idaho. We will cover a variety of bird conservation issues, including continuing topics on Short-eared Owls, bird window strikes, uncapped pipes, Migratory Bird Treaty Act centennial, high elevation birds, and workshops for federal agencies.

Workshops

- Introduction to R; Jon Horne- This workshop will provide an introduction to R, an open-source (i.e., free) statistics and graphic software environment that has become the new standard for ecological data analysis. Participants will learn the basics of the R language, useful packages for ecological research, and graphics options. Participants will need to bring their own laptop with R installed. Instructions on installing R will be provided prior to the workshop. (Limit: 30)
- Yellow-billed Cuckoo; Emily Teachout and Murrelet Halterman- Workshop will provide information about this rare, but wide spread bird, in the northwestern US. Learn about the cuckoo's distribution, state and federal status, critical habitat, ESA compliance, presence survey protocols, and research needs. Don't miss your chance to go cuckoo with TWS and SNVB this year! (Limit: 30)

- Terrestrial Mollusks; Tom Burke, Paul Hendricks, Mike Lucid- This workshop will provide an introduction to the land snails and slugs of the Pacific Northwest. Topics to be covered include priority species for survey and monitoring, useful references, land mollusk life histories and habitat associations, where and when to conduct surveys, and suggestions for designing surveys. Experience using keys for species identification of a variety of specimens will be emphasized. A hand lens would be useful to bring. (Limit: 30, Additional cost: Required book: "Land snails and slugs of the Pacific Northwest" by Tom Burke- \$30)
- Manuscript Preparation; Vaughn L. Paragamian- A half day workshop geared toward students but open to anyone interested in the ins and outs of publishing their research. (Limit: 24)
- Chemical Immobilization and Handling- This 2-day workshop on Wildlife Handling and Chemical Immobilization is a slightly condensed version of the 3-day courses that Global Wildlife Resources (http://www.wildliferesources.com) teaches across the county. Dr. Mark Johnson is a dynamic instructor who teaches practical field-based training to maximize human safety, field success, animal care, and professionalism. He is well known for developing ethical practices and habits in his students. This is one of the most-extensive Wildlife Handling and Chemical Immobilization courses taught in North America. This 2-day course is authorized to provide 12 hours of credit for the TWS Certified Wildlife Biologist Renewal/Professional Development Certificate Program. This workshop can also be applied toward any state or Federal certification program. Additional information: Link to informational flyer. (Limit: 30; Additional Fee: \$150)

Student Activities

- Student Mentoring Session- Students and mentors come participate in the student-mentor session! Students will be able to interact with professionals from private, state and federal organizations to ask specific questions about career opportunities, experiences, and expectations. This session will also offer students a chance to obtain some perspective on organizational culture, learn about the different types of wildlife work that goes on within various sectors and agencies, and hopefully gain a better understanding of challenges and advancements in the profession as well as characteristics for a successful professional.
- Quiz Bowl- If you have attended a parent TWS meeting, you may have seen or
 participated in this fun tradition where teams of students meet in head-to-head intellectual
 combat to determine who has the greatest and most diverse knowledge of ecology and
 wildlife science. Get a team together and show your school, state, chapter, or section
 pride!
- **Breakfast With A Wildlifer-** This activity is meant to be an informal breakfast session where small groups of graduate, undergraduate, and even high school students can visit with wildlife professionals within their field of interest. Students will have opportunities to ask for advice about jobs, graduate school, and volunteer opportunities and any other questions they may have.

Accommodations

Arrangements have been made for accommodations at the Coeur d'Alene Resort. Your support of the meeting by staying at this location is appreciated. Space still available!!! Want to present at the Conference but do not want to prepare a full presentation or poster? The Partners invite you to present at the Ignite session on Tuesday 23 February. These short to-the-point talks provide a great platform for people to quickly share project updates, notes from the field, or other important topics that don't require a full 20-minute presentation. IGNITE talks are short (e.g., 5 minutes) and each slide in a presentation is left on the screen for a very short time period (e.g., 15 seconds). Both Idaho and Washington meetings recently included an IGNITE session and they were well received and a fun way to get involved.
